
LOVE TRUMPS HATE

CALIFORNIA POLITICS

A day after the President's guidelines for anti-gender discrimination in bathrooms suffered an attack, legislation to correct it in California heads to Gov. Brown's desk. The Sacramento Bee describes how California stays on the forefront of acceptance in this social issue.

Many see the use of taxpayer dollars to develop new drugs as a partnership with the large drug companies – a partnership quickly dropped when the pricing is set too high for those same taxpayers to afford the drugs they require to live.



Proposition 61, the Drug Price Relief Act, will bring \$100 Million in advertising to California from Big Pharma seeking to defeat it. Ballotpedia describes this and other propositions in a non partisan manner.



Even seemingly minor bills can get mired in nonpartisan politics. The decision to end Daylight Savings Time, for instance, is described as something that should 'be handled at the Federal Level' in this <u>Fresno Bee article</u>. When you've stopped laughing at that suggestion, the article provides an interesting glimpse into the daily lives of our legislators.

Remember when we decided to spend more on K-12 schools? Well that choice was not permanent and the funds are

drying up. This <u>Fact Sheet</u> from the CALIFORNIA BUDGET & POLICY CENTER shows why this November's ballot will include Prop. 55, and the wealthiest income earners won't be off the hook for a while (<u>Ballotpedia</u>).



BUSINESS AND NATIONAL POLITICS

It makes sense that the <u>cost of living</u> in Paradise (or Hawaii) might be higher, but how does that explain New Jersey?





GOP candidates and their media lackeys are claiming that the recovery we're experiencing is 'slow' due to President Obama. They're flat lying.

The <u>Economic Policy Institute</u> explains clearly that "The recovery since 2009 has been historically slow, and the disappointing pace can be explained entirely by the fiscal

General ELECTION News

As expected, the General Election coverage by the national "Media" is all about creating enough hysteria so that the public is forced to pay attention.

California ENVIRONMENT



San Francisco has taken the plunge to ban single use water bottles. Many think these handy containers are recycled and don't harm our environment. That is a lie created and sustained by the oil industry that provides the raw material for their manufacture. This <u>SF Gate</u> article also points out that their use also disguises the reality that municipalities

aren't making enough safe and clean water available for the public.

Some observers see a path to smarter water use for California. The problem is, nobody actually measures how much we use, and how we're using it. This GRIST article lays out the issues. Where "habit", "convention" and "grandfathered water rights" exist, little hope remains of either monitoring or regulating its use. Speaking of which, how DOES Nestlé get away with pumping out our water for next to nothing? LA Magazine starts the discussion.






All over the nation, Oil Companies are finding resistance to their supposed "right" to feed us with fossil fuels – and destroy our environment in the process. While it is not simple to find unbiased information from either of the 'sides' of the Dakota Access Pipeline (DAPL), the New York Times is trying. While in California, hydraulic fracturing

(fracking) is being shown to poison our dwindling fresh water supplies. Only if you work for a water bottling company is that good news. The <u>Center for Biological Diversity</u> has filed a lawsuit to protect our precious aquifers and <u>ThinkProgress</u> describes it. Our own Legislature has passed a new and ambitious law as the <u>Sacramento Bee</u> reports.

California ENVIRONMENT (cont.)

The AQMD (Air Quality Management District) is faced with a proposed regulatory overhaul, so meetings are being held all across the State. Layers of legislation overlap, yet do not ensure compliance. CEPA is one agency that attempts to come to grips with the worst offenders. On the public side, Tom Steyer and the NEXTGEN organization stand up for clean air standards against the forces that want none.





Geeks have to figure out how to distribute energy from solar power after the sun goes down. The <u>San Diego Tribune</u> describes some of the efforts to integrate energy storage and the power grid. Everybody else seems to be arguing over how fast we can cut off fossil fuels, and how it should be done. Capitol Weekly

discusses the end effect – greenhouse gases. The longer it takes, the more certain people (with interests in the fossil fuel industry) benefit, as the <u>LA</u> <u>Times argues</u>.

We're not the only state that sees the nasty results of Climate Change. Alaskans may be seeing them earlier than we are. These images are taken only seven years apart of the same spot.

Bill Moyers chronicles the effects.

EDITOR'S PAGE


